
Forty Acres and a Mule: The Freedmens Bureau and Black Land Ownership



First published in 1978, Claude F. Oubres Forty Acres and a Mule has since become a definitive study in the history of American Reconstruction. Drawing on collection of government records and newspapers, Oubre examines what he sees as the crucial question of Reconstruction: Why were the far majority of freed slaves denied the opportunity to own land during the Reconstruction era, leaving them vulnerable to a persecution that strongly resembled slavery? Oubre recounts the struggle of black families to acquire land and how the U.S. government agency Freedmens Bureau both served and obstructed them.
